



ANN H. MORGAN

1982-1966, UNITED STATES

American zoologist and aquatic ecologist, whose research focused on limnology and animal hibernation.

In 1912, she published a doctoral thesis on the biology of Mayflies (Ephemeroptera) at Cornell University (USA).

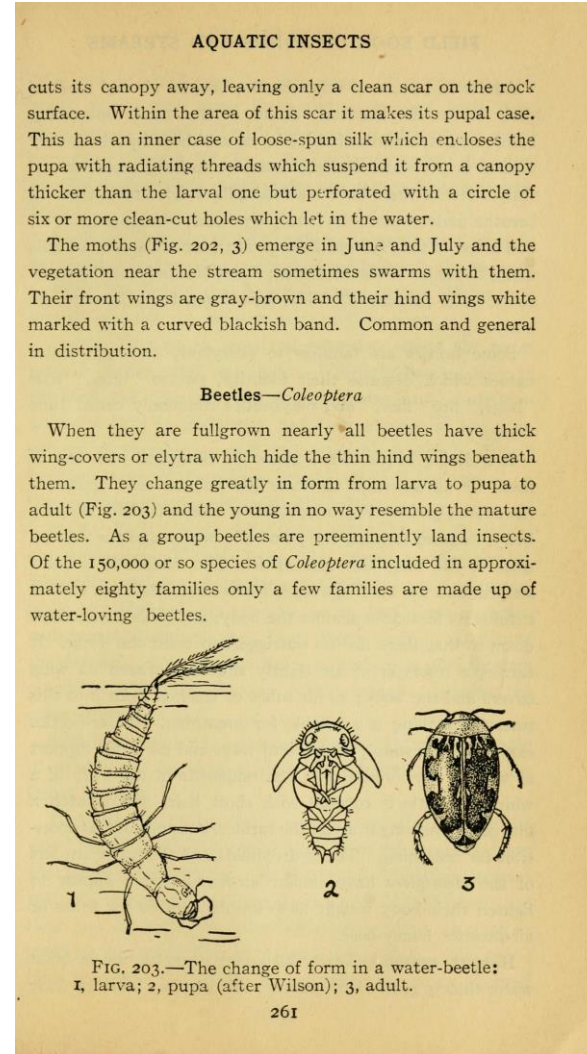
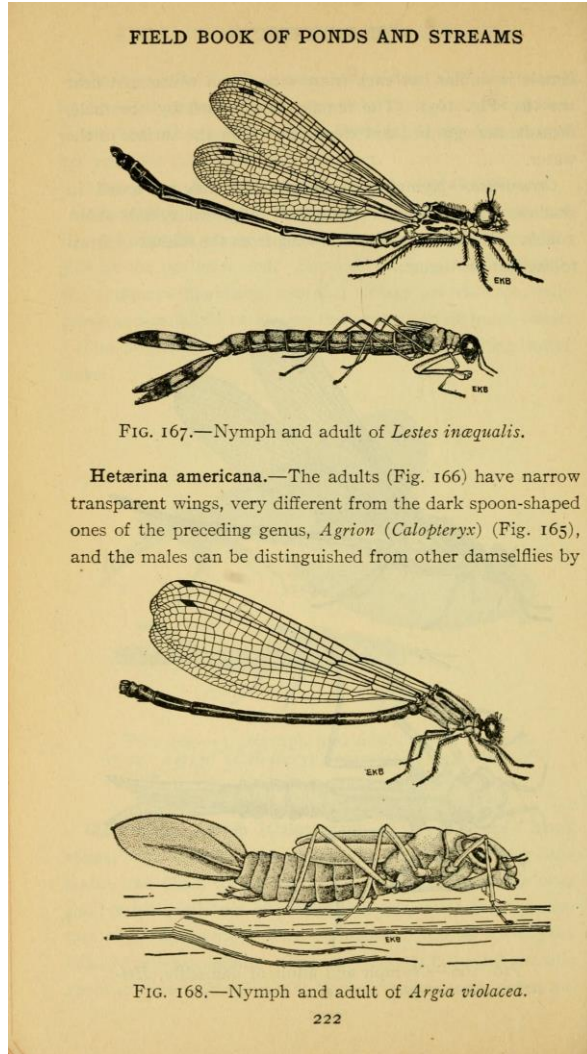
She did research in the Tropical Laboratory in Karabo, British Guiana; this research became the basis for her book, *A Field Book of Ponds and Streams* (published in 1930).

She tried to establish conservation and ecology as mainstays of study in science classes.

HERSTORY

She was one of the three women featured in a group of 250 leading scientists of the time in the journal, *American Men of Science* (1933).
